Course objectives (competences) and learning outcomes:	Objectives of the course program (competences): after attending theoretical classes and passing the exam, the students learn and develop skills: - are introduced to the characteristics of trauma, - etiology and epidemiology of injuries to the teeth, supporting tissues, bones, and soft tissues, - are introduced to the classification of injuries in the orofacial area and the protocol for recording, - provide first aid and treatment of injuries, - recognize the complications that can occur as a result of injuries to the teeth and supporting tissues, and their treatment

Dental crown fractures..... 2 - enamel infraction, - enamel fracture, - enamel and dentin fracture without exposed pulp, - enamel and dentin fracture with exposed pulp Outcomes: Students acquire basic knowledge about dental crown injuries, in which the damage can range from enamel cracking to a greater deficiency of hard dental substances with opening of the pulp chamber, and how they should be treated. 4. Crown and root fractures, root fractures..... 2 - etiology, - classification, - clinical findings, - therapy, - post-traumatic follow-up and prognosis Outcomes: Students learn about crown and root injuries, and root injuries that involve multiple tissues, how they are clinically diagnosed, and what the therapeutic approach is for their treatment and follow-up. 5. Injuries to the supporting apparatus of the teeth.....2 - concussion, - subluxation, - extrusive luxation, - lateral luxation, - intrusive luxation, - avulsion Outcomes: The students are introduced to injuries to the supporting tissues of the
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		teeth. They are trained to perform clinical and radiological examinations, to make a diagnosis, and to implement appropriate treatment according to the type of injury and how to place a wire composite splint. 6. Traumatic injuries to primary teeth 2 - etiology, frequency, - fractures of primary teeth (crown fractures, coronal-root fractures, and root fractures) - injuries to the supporting tissues of primary teeth (concussion, subluxation, extrusion, lateral luxation, intrusion, avulsion) - post-traumatic follow-up and prognosis Outcomes: The students are introduced to traumatic injuries to primary teeth that lead to fracture or dislocation of the tooth. They are introduced to the specific characteristics of the injuries and how they should be treated in the primary dentition. 7. Complications of traumatic injuries to teeth and supporting tissues..... 2 - complications of traumatic injuries to primary teeth - complications of traumatic injuries to permanent teeth - consequences on permanent teeth after trauma to primary teeth Outcomes: The students are introduced to the complications that can occur as a result of traumatic injuries to primary and permanent teeth, such as loss of vitality, pulp obliteration, root resorption, and premature tooth loss. They are introduced to injuries to primary teeth and what consequences this can have on the permanent tooth germ. 8. Aesthetic restoration of injured teeth2 - restoration by connecting the fractured fragment - restorations with composite - laminate veneers Outcomes: The students are introduced to the methods, techniques, and materials with which aesthetic disorders of the anterior teeth can be corrected. They are introduced to the procedure for connecting the fractured fragment if brought by the patient, and how to make a composite superstructure to restore aesthetics in the frontal area. 9. Prevention of traumatic injuries to the mouth and teeth, medical documentation, and legal qualification of traumatic injuries..... 1 Outcomes: The students are introduced to the preventive measures that can prevent injuries, such as a mouth guard when playing sports, a helmet for motorcycle riders, airbags in cars. Students are introduced to how to educate other professionals on how to deal with dental injuries. They should be able to classify dental injuries according to the severity of the injury.
