They will acquire knowledge about the biomechanics, retention, stabilization, and occlusal concepts of removable prosthodontic constructions, as well as about clinical procedures from diagnosis to delivery and maintenance of prosthesis. The student will be able to perform clinical assessment, select the appropriate type of prosthesis, and carry out the entire fabrication process. In addition to theoretical and practical skills, they will also develop analytical skills for planning prosthodontic therapy and solving complex cases in dental practice. The student will also study the different possibilities for repairing removable prosthodontic restorations.
