Course objectives (competences) and learning outcomes:	Awareness of the rich pathology in the oral cavity at the level of the oral mucosa, through the implementation of basic knowledge in the field of medicine, close cooperation, and the application of a multidisciplinary approach. The systematization of oral pathology into a single whole will facilitate the diagnostic procedure that leads to early and accurate diagnosis, which is a basic prerequisite for fulfilling the ultimate goal, which is successful prevention and therapy of oral diseases. The student will be able to diagnose oral diseases, clarify differential diagnostic dilemmas, and distinguish physiological structures from pathological changes. Ability to conduct a clinical examination of a patient with oral diseases, prescribe therapy, monitor therapeutic results, and resolve possible complications.

Detailed course content by chapters and units, with learning outcomes for each chapter	Theoretical teaching - lectures Chapter 1 - Introduction to oral medicine and pathology. -Anatomy of the oral cavity and classification of diseases in the oral cavity.....2 classes -Histology of the oral cavity1 class -Oral flora.....1 class -Oral immunity.....1 class -Damage and healing of soft tissues.....2 classes -Pathology of the oral mucosa - efflorescences.....3 classes Results from chapter 1: After studying this chapter, students will be able to identify and describe the anatomical and histological characteristics of the oral cavity. They will acquire basic knowledge of the classification of diseases in the oral cavity, which is the basis for further diagnosis and treatment. Students will be able to understand the interactions between microorganisms and relate them to oral diseases. They will understand the basic mechanisms of oral immunity – nonspecific and specific immune protection, inflammatory processes, different types of cellular abnormalities, as well as the healing of injured soft tissues. They will learn to recognize and categorize primary and secondary efflorescences, describe their characteristics, and relate these lesions to certain diseases for which they are characteristic.			

	Chapter 2 - Pathological changes of the lips and tongue, and palate -Pathological changes of the lips.....3 classes -Pathological changes of the tongue.....3 classes -Pathological changes of the palate.....1 class Results from chapter 2: By studying this chapter, students will be able to distinguish congenital anomalies from acquired pathological conditions of the lips, tongue and palate. They will identify the most common clinical pictures and will develop skills for prevention, diagnosis and planning of appropriate therapy. Chapter 3 – Oral Cavity Injuries and Systemic Diseases - Oral mucosal injuries and side effects.....1 class - Oral changes in hematological diseases.....2 classes - Clinical manifestations of the oral mucosa in cardiovascular and respiratory diseases1 class - Clinical manifestations of the oral mucosa in kidney diseases and diseases of the gastrointestinal tract (GIT)1 class - Clinical manifestations of the oral mucosa in hormonal and metabolic disorders1 class - Clinical manifestations of the oral mucosa in nutritional disorders and vitamin deficiencies1 class - Clinical manifestations of the oral mucosa in neurological and psychosomatic disorders1 class Results from chapter 3: Students will learn about the different types of oral mucosal injuries: mechanical, thermal, chemical, and radiation. They will learn to recognize the clinical manifestations of these injuries and understand the mechanisms through which they occur. In addition, the student will learn about treating these injuries. After studying this chapter, students will understand the characteristic oral manifestations in patients with diseases of various organ systems. They will be able to relate changes in the oral cavity to disorders of the organ systems, which is important for early diagnosis and an interdisciplinary approach. Chapter 4 – Age-related oral diseases -Oral medicine in children and the elderly (oral pediatrics and oral gerontology)1 class Results from chapter 4: After this chapter, students will learn about the specifics of age-related oral diseases. They will be able to recognize the most common age-related oral conditions and approach their diagnosis and treatment accordingly. Chapter 5 - Salivary Gland Diseases -Soft, reversible, painful swellings; hard, irreversible, painless swellings and elastic, rubbery, and solitary changes.....1 class -Changes in salivary secretion and sensitivity.....1 class Results from chapter 5: Students will learn about the function of the salivary glands and the disorders that may occur, such as hypo- and hypersalivation. They will learn to recognize inflammatory conditions of these glands, to relate salivary gland diseases to other systemic diseases, in order to establish an accurate diagnosis and suggest appropriate treatment. Chapter 6 - Oral diseases resulting from sexual contact -Lues.....1 class -AIDS.....1 class Results from chapter 6: Upon completion of this chapter, students will be able to recognize the oral manifestations of sexually transmitted diseases such as Lues and AIDS. They will learn about their clinical course, diagnostic approach and the importance of early detection within the general health of the patient. Chapter 7 - Oral Mucosal Infections -Bacterial Infections...3 classes -Fungal Infections...3 classes -Viral Infections...3 classes Results from chapter 7: After this lecture, students will learn about the different
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	types of infections affecting the oral mucosa, including non-specific and specific bacterial, viral, and fungal infections. They will be able to differentiate the clinical presentations, understand their pathogenesis, and suggest appropriate diagnostic and therapeutic approaches. Chapter 8 - Oral Aphthous Ulcerations -Stomatitis aphthosa chronica recidivans.....1 class -Other aphthous ulcers.....3 classes Results from chapter 8: Upon completion of this chapter, students will be able to distinguish between the different forms of oral aphthous ulcers and their clinical features. They will learn about the etiology, diagnosis, and therapeutic options for each type, with particular focus on chronic and recurrent forms as well as ulcerations associated with systemic diseases. Chapter 9 - Mucocutaneous Bullous Diseases -Erythema exudativum multiforme and Sy. Steven-Johnson.....1 class -Pemphigus vulgaris, pemphigoid bullosus, pemphigoid mucosae oris.....2 classes -Lichen planus, Linear IgA disease..... 2 classes -Dermatitis herpetiformis, Epidermolysis bullosa.....1 class Results from chapter 9: After studying this chapter, students will gain a detailed understanding of the various mucocutaneous bullous diseases that manifest in the oral cavity. They will learn to recognize the specific clinical pictures of the diseases and will develop skills for differential diagnosis and selection of an appropriate therapeutic approach, as well as prevention of complications thereof. Chapter 10 - Systemic Autoimmune Diseases -Rheumatoid Arthritis, Juvenile Chronic Arthritis, Felty's Syndrome, and Lupus Erythematosus.....1 class -Reiter Syndrome, Scleroderma, Morbus Addison, Myasthenia gravis.....1 class Results from chapter 10: Students will learn about systemic autoimmune diseases and their oral manifestations. They will learn to relate oral symptoms to diseases such as Lupus Erythematosus, Reiter Syndrome, and Scleroderma, and will develop the ability for early detection and collaboration with other medical specialties in the treatment of these patients. Chapter 11 - Oral Allergic Reactions -Stomatitis Alergica Medica, Enanthema Fixum, Stomatitis Protetica.....3 classes Results from chapter 11: After studying this chapter, students will be able to recognize the different types of oral allergic reactions, such as stomatitis Alergica Medica, enanthema Fixum, and stomatitis Protetica. They will understand their etiology, clinical manifestations, and develop an approach for allergen identification and selection of appropriate therapy. 12. Chapter - Precancerous and cancerous conditions in the oral cavity -Facultative and obligate precancerous conditions.....3 classes -Carcinoma in the oral cavity.....1 class Results from chapter 12: After studying this chapter, students will acquire basic knowledge about precancerous and cancerous conditions in the oral cavity. They will learn to distinguish between facultative and obligate precancerous conditions and recognize the early signs of precancerous conditions and oral cancer to make a timely diagnosis and refer the patient to appropriate treatment. 13. Chapter - Oral manifestations of immunodeficiencies, vasculitis, paraproteinemias, and amyloidosis - Primary and secondary immunodeficiencies.....1 class - Paraproteinemias, amyloidosis, temporal arteritis, polyarteritis nodosa, hypersensitivity vasculitis, and Wegener's granulomatosis.....1 class Results from chapter 13: Students will be able to identify the characteristic oral manifestations associated with congenital and acquired immunodeficiencies. They will understand how immune system disorders affect oral health and will develop
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		skills to approach the diagnosis and treatment of these patients.
