Course objectives (competences) and learning outcomes:	Objectives of the course program (competences): after following the theoretical and practical classes and passing the exam, the student acquires knowledge and skills: - to perform a clinical examination, - to assess the level of oral hygiene - to determine which caries risk group the patient belongs to, - to be able to give advice on proper nutrition to preserve oral health - to be able to implement endogenous and exogenous fluoride prophylaxis - to assess the need for sealing fissures and pits, and to implement the technique - to detect an initial carious lesion and to implement all necessary preventive methods for its stopping and healing			
12.	Detailed course content by chapters and units, with learning outcomes for each chapter	Course content: CHAPTER 1. Preventive Dentistry.....2 classes - basics of Preventive Dentistry - definition, - oral health, - categories of oral diseases, - levels of prevention, Results from chapter 1: Students acquire basic knowledge about Preventive Dentistry and how to prevent the occurrence of disease. They are introduced to the three basic categories of diseases in dentistry: dental caries, periodontitis, and oral cancer. Students learn about the three levels of prevention, primary, secondary, and tertiary, and how they are implemented. CHAPTER 2. Oral homeostasis4 classes - role of saliva, - muco-enamel barrier and defense of the enamel surface - processes of de- and remineralization, remineralizing agents Results from chapter 2: Students gain knowledge about the protective role of saliva and the buffers in it, as well as the processes that take place in the mouth as a result of food intake and cause a demineralization process that is followed by a remineralization process. Students are introduced to the agents that can be a source of calcium and phosphate ions that improve the remineralization process. CHAPTER 3. Dental Caries6 classes - Dental plaque (formation, composition, metabolic activities, mechanical and chemical control) - Etiology of dental caries, definition, primary and secondary factors			

	- Early childhood caries - Caries diagnosis and clinical examination - Caries activity Results from chapter 3: Students acquire basic knowledge about the prevention of dental caries by achieving a balance between the control of oral biofilm, dietary habits, oral hygiene, and the control of the loss of minerals from enamel and dentin, in order to keep teeth healthy. CHAPTER 4. Nutrition and Caries.....2 classes - the influence of nutrition on the occurrence of oral diseases, - the influence of nutrition on developing teeth and functional teeth, - the role of sugars, sugar substitutes, - the influence of fats, proteins, vitamins, and minerals, - cariogenic potential of food Results from chapter 4: Students will learn about the influence of nutrition on the occurrence of oral diseases. Students are introduced to the effect of sugars on the processes that lead to the occurrence of dental caries and what strategies should be taken to keep teeth healthy. CHAPTER 5. Fluorides in the prevention of dental caries. 4 classes - chemical and biological properties of fluorides, - distribution, biokinetics, toxicology, - mechanism of cariostatic effect of fluorides - endogenous, exogenous, and combined methods of fluoride prophylaxis Results from chapter 5: The student is introduced to fluoride as a powerful tool in controlling the process of caries formation, the balance of loss/return of minerals in the tooth structure and how it is incorporated into the structure of hard dental substances and protects them from the formation of carious lesions. CHAPTER 6. The role of oral hygiene in the prevention of oral diseases2 classes - oral hygiene equipment, - brushing technique, frequency, and length - the influence of fluorides in toothpastes - clinical effect of biofilm control on the occurrence of dental caries and periodontitis - chemical control of dental plaque Results from chapter 6: The student becomes familiar with the means and methods used for the prevention of dental caries and periodontitis through mechanical removal of biofilm by applying professional and individual strategies. They are also familiar with the chemical means that can help control the occurrence of mature dental plaque. CHAPTER 7. Sealing of fissures and pits.....2 classes - method of sealing of fissures and pits, - meaning, indications, and contraindications, - technique of performance, - materials for sealing Results from chapter 7: The student becomes familiar with the morphological characteristics of teeth that have fissures and pits, and how to prevent the accumulation of biofilm in them and prevent the occurrence of carious lesions. Students are trained to perform the technique of sealing fissures and use different materials for that purpose. CHAPTER 8. Caries risk or caries activity.....2 classes - determination of caries risk, - determination of caries activity - saliva, quantity, buffer capacity, - microorganisms in saliva, - Karyogram Results from chapter 8: The student is introduced to the techniques of how to effectively deal with dental caries throughout life through the detection and diagnosis of carious lesions with a focus on understanding the activity of the
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	lesion and determining the risk of caries for each tooth and in each patient. CHAPTER 9. Dental erosion1 class - etiology, - external and internal factors, - biological factors - prevention Results from chapter 9: The student is introduced to the erosion of teeth caused by acids that are not of bacterial origin, diagnosis of the disease, early detection, severity of changes, and how to prevent their occurrence. CHAPTER 10. Preventive and interceptive orthodontics2 classes - etiology and prevention of orthodontic irregularities in the prenatal and postnatal period, - premature loss of primary teeth, - interceptive measures in children of preschool and school age - prevention of traumatic injuries to the teeth and jaws, - predisposing factors, - use of mouthguards Results from chapter 10: The student is introduced to the occurrence of orthodontic anomalies as a result of anomalies in the development of teeth and jaws. The early treatment in each child is carried out individually. The student is introduced to the importance of preserving primary teeth and their role in preventing the occurrence of these anomalies. The students are introduced to the fabrication of mouthguards that can significantly reduce the risk of injury to the teeth and mouth. CHAPTER 11. Prevention of periodontitis1 class - etiopathogenesis - clinical signs and diagnosis - prevention and therapy of periodontal diseases - chemoprophylaxis of oral diseases Results from chapter 11: Students will learn about periodontitis as a complex inflammatory disease that can be a risk factor for other diseases in the body. Students gain knowledge about methods for preventing and treating this disease. CHAPTER 12. Oral Health Promotion2 classes - strategies for preserving and promoting oral health, - dental education, - methods and means of dental education, - influence of motivational factors on dental education Results from chapter 12: The student becomes familiar with the strategies that should be taken to preserve oral health at a global and individual level, what methods and means should be taken to educate patients about preserving the health of teeth and periodontal tissues. Practical teaching-exercises - Introductory exercises, oral health and categories of oral diseases, levels of prevention, patient admission, and plan for the implementation of preventive dental activities4 classes - Role of dental plaque in the occurrence of dental caries and periodontitis, plaque indicators, methods of mechanical and chemical control4 classes - Oral hygiene, basic and auxiliary equipment, technique, duration, frequency of brushing4 classes - Diagnostics of the risk of dental caries, nutrition, oral hygiene, quantity, buffer capacity, microorganisms in saliva, karyogram.....3classes - Fluorides in the prevention of dental caries, endo- and exogenous methods, combined methods, home and professional use of fluorides4 classes - Methods of sealing fissures and pits, indications and contraindications, performance technique, sealing materials...4 classes - Education and motivation in the promotion of oral health, holding educational lectures and workshops in preschool and school institutions
